Characteristics of the Student Body:

The student body of the College in 2023 were fulltime students in classes from Prep to Year 12. There are more students in the Primary and than Secondary. Students reside within 20 minutes of the College with only a few more than 30 minutes from the College. Due to the roads and the location of the College, travel via bicycle or walking is problematic, and majority of students are dropped off and picked by parents. The second largest means of transportation is the College buses.

The College has an open enrolment, so students have a range of academic ability and diversity. Some students require additional support in their learning while others require extension. The College enjoys some cultural variety and reflects the cultural diversity similar in proportion to the Coolum / Sunshine Coast population. There is a significant number of the College population who regularly engage in attending Christian churches in the local community.

Students in the College have a range of talents and interests. They have achieved some great results in the sporting context and the secondary College has had some wonderful drama productions.

The educational program of the College is based on the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority, (ACARA), as well as Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA).

Parent, Student and Teacher Satisfaction with the College

Coolum Beach Christian College has a strong commitment to partnering with parents in their child's educational journey. Coolum Beach Christian College is committed to providing an education grounded in Christian values. In 2023 the College re-established the PnF (Parent and Friends committee). There was a substantial interest amongst the parent community to volunteer and support the College. The College enjoyed some significant highlight events together with the community in which the PnF played a significant role. Mother's Day assembly and events were well attended, and the College was bursting at the seams with this well attended event. Father's Day was also a significant event with large percentage of fathers attending the event. Grandparents' day saw visitors from interstate as well as locally attend and pairing this event with Book Character parade saw hundreds of visitors to the campus for this event. A tremendous success for our size of College. The PnF organised the traditional Neon dance party which saw large numbers of families attend this event which had not been held since COVID started. CBCC has a tremendous community culture which had been dormant during COVID. The flood of support and engagement from

parents in 2023 was significant and marked the true end of the damage COVID had brought on the community.

Student data from surveys indicate high levels of satisfaction in the Primary. Whilst the student feedback in secondary was less positive than Primary it remained at high levels of satisfaction. The year 12 exit surveys completed at the end of the year are wonderful times of reflection on their experiences and growth as students at CBCC. This overwhelmingly positive feedback from our seniors was in line with other years in its depth of positivity as they reflected on their educational journey.

Teacher satisfaction in their work is positive. Teachers have indicated in surveys that the workload of teaching, time to meet the demands of the job and the remuneration at CBCC are two issues that negatively impact what is a great place to work. Staff value the collegiality of their colleagues, the ability to express their Christian values freely with students and colleagues and the general positive sense of community that is CBCC. Staff have particularly been impacted by changes in curriculum both at the senior QCAA level as well as the introduction of Version 9 of the national curriculum.

Lack of facilities due to the restrictions brought about by the Koala overlay on the property has had a significant impact on staff and students. This is particularly noticeable in the sufficient but limited sports facilities which we have not been able to build since 2020. In 2023 a ruling by QCAT which makes it possible for the College to begin construction of additional facilities will significantly improve the resources in 2025 at CBCC.

Highlights from 2023:

The College was delighted to receive a positive outcome to continue providing minimum facilities for the college program. This will enable the College to build the classrooms, Arts facilities and the sports facilities to accommodate the Boards strategic plan of a double stream College.

The College expanded its sports offerings through the Primary FAST program and the Secondary SWELL program. This increase in students' sporting and wellbeing programs positively impacted the student body.

Two of the Primary playgrounds we completely replaced, and students are enjoying new play equipment during their learning breaks.

The College built a new S-block for the senior students making was for a refurbishment of L-block into a Primary classroom as well as the newly relocated College business office. The relocation and refurbishment project will allow for an increase in our Early Learning Center to accommodate at least double the current enrolment when refurbishment and approval is gained in 2024.

In 2023 the College welcomed a new Principal, Kenneth McAllister. This was after the Retirement of the previous Principal, Mr. Hornby in 2022. The College also welcomed a new Head of Primary, Mrs Julia Harbor, in 2023. The College also welcomed a new Head of

Welfare, Mr. Holloway in 2023. The rest of the management team is ongoing from previous years.

During 2023, the College increased the teacher allocation in the Learning Support department. This saw an increase from 1 part time person to two part time staff increasing learning support teachers from an FTE of .8 to FTE of 1.2 during 2023 across two people.

Significant work has been undertaken in 2023 to begin the process of updating the curriculum at CBCC to align with version 9 of the National Curriculum and aligning the College values and Christian faith to the pedagogical practice of the College.

The College staff had whole staff PD from Psychologist "Mike the Psych" both in January and July PD opportunities. ISQ (Independent Schools Queensland) also did a whole college PD in January.

The College continues to enjoy steady growth and again saw a record number of students in the Colleges history enrolled at CBCC in 2023. (August census data).

Attendance at CBCC is managed by student services. Roll is taken twice a day. Parents of students are requested to contact the College to indicate the reason for non-attendance on any given day. Parents provide acknowledgement and inform the College of an absence either in person, by phone or directly in the parent portal. Total absences are reported to parents via academic reports. Students with poor attendance records are individually contacted regarding attendance. Interaction is made with parents on an individual basis, initially via the class or Pastoral Care teacher and Heart Advocate, if necessary, via the Principal.
